The regular meeting of the Hammond Common Council of the City of Hammond, Lake County, Indiana was held on August 28, 2017 in the Hammond City Council Chambers.

Council President Janet Venecz presided.

Councilman Woerpel and Councilman Higgs are present.

Councilman Woerpel - When you say the exempt debt goes away, does the referendum take care of the exempt debt we're carrying now? The part of the referendum covering the exempt debt that we have now, that makes it go away in 2020?

Ms. Pritchett - No, the impact of the referendum, it doesn't cover that. It's just, by law, that's automatically taken off of the taxpayers bill. We were only exempt through 2019 to request that extra levy from taxpayers

Councilman Higgs - In regards to the referendum, I see you have some scheduled dates of pursuing it and getting it out to the public. Generally, how is the response, or how do you feel in terms of the public and the city of Hammond? How are they responding to the referendum?

Mr. Boone - Dr. Watkins and some of our school board members have attended community sessions and we find that it's been very receptive with the community. I think it's been very positive.

Councilman Markovich - How many total employees do you have?

Mr. Rivera - Full time, I think there are approximately 1700, and then we have subs and whatnot.

Councilman Markovich - Total. Subs, part time, whatever.

Mr. Rivera - Over 2000.

Councilman Markovich - And how many students do you have?

Mr. Boone - 13,800 and that's including pre-school.

Councilman Markovich - So how is it that you provide 26 thousand meals a day if you only have 13,800 students?

Mr. Boone - Breakfast and lunch. Sometimes a third meal.

Ms. Mayerik - We actually provide the elementary schools, we provide free breakfast and free lunch. We also have a partnership at a number of our schools with the YMCA daycare and because of that we also provide to a number of children who stay in the daycare a supper also.

Councilman Markovich - How many total of these lunches are free and how many total are reduced, lunches?

Ms. Mayerik - All of our lunches in the elementary school, all of the breakfasts and lunches are free because we have such a high rate of free lunches at the elementary level we are able to get subsidized from the government.

Councilman Markovich - So, what percentage of your total students are on that program?

Ms. Mayerik - 75% is our poverty rate. That's the total of free and reduced lunches.

Councilman Higgs - Is that for the entire city?

Ms. Mayerik - Yes.

Councilman Markovich - How many of the students live outside the city that attend Hammond schools?

Mr. Boone - Roughly, right now, we're at (unclear).

Councilman Markovich - 352 attend school here but don't live in the city?

Mr. Boone - Correct.

Councilman Markovich - Okay, and then how many employees live outside the district?

Mr. Rivera - 1,042 live in and approximately 1000 live out.

Councilman Markovich - So, half then.

Councilman Markovich - How many of your administrators live outside the city.

Mr. Rivera - I don't know off the top of my head.

Councilman Markovich - Do you have a list like that?

Mr. Rivera - Sure, yea, of course we keep that information.

Councilman Markovich - I got a question on these fact sheets. Maybe I'm not reading it right. But like for \$100 thousand home, how do you figure \$67,250 for a Homestead deduction? How do you come up with that figure?

Ms. Pritchett - You have your Homestead .... I can put it in but the way the formula works... The Homestead deduction by itself is \$45 thousand plus the Homestead supplemental is the difference between the actual Homestead, your actual cost of your home, minus the \$45 thousand, times 35%, that comes to the Homestead supplemental. Then you have the \$3 thousand for your mortgage if you have a mortgage of \$3 thousand or more. That's how you come up to the deduction.

Councilman Markovich - So on \$100 thousand home you're saying somebody's going to get \$67,200 of a Homestead deduction?

Ms. Pritchett - If they live in the house, yes.

Councilman Markovich - I'm not getting that kind of deduction off of my tax bill.

Ms. Pritchett - If you go out to county and file the papers, you have to go out to the county and file the papers.

Councilman Markovich - File what papers?

Ms. Pritchett - The papers for the Homestead.

Councilman Markovich - I have all of that. Mine doesn't total no \$67 thousand though.

Mr. Boone - I recommend you go into the tax calculator and fill it in and it'll show you what yours should be and then compare it to your bill.

Councilman Markovich - I think that maybe what your examples that you gave, I think maybe you should do that and list that and put that out as a flyer for people to see that.

Ms. Pritchett - We have that. I went through, actually talked to Mike W. this evening, we went through to make sure as far as the information as to how the deductions come up and that's exactly how the calculation is done. So, I don't know exactly, you know, looking at your tax bill, what happens to your tax bill, to actually see what's on your tax bill and come up with the calculations.

Councilman Markovich - I would like on this tax impact sheets for \$100 thousand, \$150 thousand, the breakdown for the \$84,750 and \$67,250, exactly what deductions, to make it easier.

Ms. Pritchett - Okay, okay.

Councilman Markovich - I heard you on the radio the other day and it's hard to give out facts and figures over the radio when people don't have nothing in front of them.

Ms. Pritchett - It is.

Councilman Markovich - Because I know when you invited us to your School Board Meeting, Mr. Sender rattled off a bunch of figures and you put your thing on the screen and nobody could see it because they said it was too small or whatever in that respect.

Ms. Pritchett - I actually brought my laptop in case someone wanted to use it to actually ....

Councilman Markovich - For each one of these Homestead Deductions, I mean a Homestead is usually \$45 thousand but then you're listing \$67,250.

Ms. Pritchett - The Homestead by itself is \$45, the supplemental is an additional portion of what you get as a deduction.

Councilman Markovich - Most people don't understand that and so, like, if you can do that like Mr. Boone said about on a computer where you can list that out then that would be a lot helpful.

Ms. Pritchett - I will, I will.

Mr. Boone - (Unclear) as what's on your tax bill currently.

Ms. Pritchett - We can do the calculation for you for how the formula works.

Councilman Higgs - The reality of it is, I mean, it's not their responsibility to tell you to file for all your exemptions, Councilman Markovich. She's only explaining what you're eligible for.

Councilman Markovich - I don't need anybody to tell me what examples or exemptions I'm entitled to or whatever.

Council President Venecz - Councilman Markovich, you have had several opportunities to ask questions. I would like to see if there is anyone else up here that would like to ask any questions.

Councilman Spitale - My question is, (unclear) assessed value going up is going up in our city, how is (unclear).

Ms. Pritchett - Currently, this year, the assessed value went down.

Councilman Spitale - (Unclear) How's that figure into the figures that you have (unclear). You don't know where it's going to be (unclear).

Mr. Boone - It does go up slightly. What it really does mean is the values of the homes have gone up slightly. The taxes will be spread over a variety of homes.

Councilman Spitale - How is that gonna (unclear)?

Ms. Pritchett - But it still, in 2020, there will be no additional tax, in 2020.

Councilman Spitale - So the figures that we have really aren't true because of the assessed value will be (unclear).

Ms. Pritchett - Well, the rate, if your house goes from \$80 to \$100 thousand, you still have the same, the example of the \$100 thousand then would still fit in to that's how much a person would pay. It depends on what's the value of your home. You could drop any value of your home into the calculator to say this is, based on this rate, this is what you're gonna pay. The rates not changing, so the  $.44\phi$  will still be in place.

Mr. Sender - It will, but the capital rate of the  $.36\phi$  that the assessed value goes up or least rental amount or paying the debt service is fixed. So if the assessed value goes up between now and 2020, that rate will come down. So that will be even more of a tax savings, again, when the exempt debt falls off. So it will be a benefit. Ms. Pritchett is correct that the  $.44\phi$  is a fixed rate and that would stay in place.

Councilman Kalwinski - You know we have a large stock of rental property in the city of Hammond. So, for the \$100 thousand home that is a rental property, what are your numbers for that? Any ideas?

Mr. Sender - We did not run on other numbers, but again, if you would take the assessed value, you know, again, times  $.80 \, \text{¢}$ , in 2020, but again, everyone's gonna see a decrease. So, you're gonna see about a  $.38 \, \text{¢}$  decrease in 2020. Now, '18 and '19, again, you just multiply, if the \$100 thousand is your assessed value, times  $.44 \, \text{¢}$  per 100, that would be what your increase is gonna be in '18 and '19, a little higher in '19. But in '20 you're going to see a decrease of  $.38 \, \text{¢}$ .

Councilman Markovich - So, with the example of \$150 thousand, correct me if I'm wrong, what is the taxes being paid now for \$150 thousand home with your so called \$84,750 deductions, what are the taxes being paid right now on that house?

Mr. Sender - I don't think, unless it's in, is it in your example, I don't know that it's in your.... it's just the increase. But again, you're presuming you're at the 1% rate.

Councilman Markovich - No, my question is, what is the taxes being paid right now on \$150 thousand home, minus your so called deductions. So you're saying an assessed value of \$65,250, what are the taxes right now on that house for the School City?

Mr. Sender - Councilman Markovich, the property taxes calculations is a little more complicated than that. You pay the lesser of either the gross rate on your net assessed value or on your gross assessed value times 1%. So, times 1% of , you know, \$150 thousand, you're probably looking at \$1,500 per year plus the exempt rate.

Councilman Markovich - So somebody right now is paying \$1,500 for school taxes on that house?

Mr. Sender - Not for school, that's for all taxes.

Councilman Markovich - No, no, I'm asking what is the person paying for a house just for the school alone. Not the total bill of \$1,500. What are they paying right now for the school portion? You had to have that figure.

Mr. Sender - You have to also understand that the tax credits, the tax cap credits are shared by all the taxing units, but I'm guessing the school's probably makes up about 40% of it. Would that be about right?

Ms. Pritchett - Yes, it's about 38% from what the calculation that I got from Mike W.

Mr. Sender - So, 38% of \$1,500.

Councilman Markovich - So, you can't figure that out? You don't have that figure?

Mr. Sender - I'm sorry I didn't bring it with me tonight. We can certainly have handouts ...

Councilman Markovich - Well, let's just say it's \$600, then. Is that a fair thing, on a \$1,500 tax bill, you're saying it's 40%, so it's just \$600 just for the school city alone, correct?

Mr. Sender - Correct.

Councilman Markovich - So now if we take this tax impact for \$150 thousand home in the year of 2018 there's gonna be an additional tax of \$287 added on to that \$600?

Mr. Sender - But you're also gonna save...

Councilman Markovich - No, that's my question. Is that what's gonna happen?

Mr. Sender - Yes.

Councilman Markovich - So then in the year 2019, so now we're up to \$600 plus \$287, so we're up to \$887, so then in the year 2019 we're gonna add another \$309 to that? Is that correct?

Mr. Sender - Sounds right?

Councilman Markovich - Okay, so just after the year 2019 on \$150 thousand home the taxes paid to the school is gonna be \$1,196, \$1,200 total, just for that house, just for the schools, correct?

Mr. Sender - Approximately.

Councilman Markovich - Yea, so that's what it is, \$1,200 you're gonna be asking. So, then, if you're gonna have 2018 and 2019 you're gonna have the \$287 and the \$309, let's just call it \$310, so \$597 additional taxes to be paid on that house. Correct?

Mr. Sender - Are you adding both years together?

Councilman Markovich - Yes.

Mr. Sender - Okay.

Councilman Markovich - So, it's gonna be \$600 additional tax is just for those two years then.

Mr. Sender - Okay.

Councilman Markovich - So you're talking \$1,200 total just for the School City alone on \$150 thousand home.

Mr. Sender - For those two years and then you go to 2020 and then you're gonna see when they ....

Councilman Markovich - Well, what happens, how much is it gonna drop? Is it gonna go from \$1,200 to \$900 then? What's it gonna be?

Mr. Sender - Well, the total savings is gonna be  $.38\phi$  and that includes all the debt. I guess we don't have it separated but the school rate will probably be around  $.70\phi$ ., the regular debt rate portion..... We'll have to get you exact numbers.

Councilman Markovich - All I'm doing is asking questions that people are asking me and I don't know, and if I'm asking you and you don't know, then who knows?

Mr. Sender - Okay.

Councilman Markovich - The bottom line is after 2019 there's gonna be an increase of \$600 if somebody's tax bill is gonna be \$1,200 just for the school itself. And you're gonna say after the year of 2020 there's gonna be a reduction, well what is that reduction gonna be?

Ms. Pritchett - On \$150 thousand house it's \$771.19 comes off for the exempt debt portion.

Councilman Markovich - So it's gonna be ...

Ms. Pritchett - \$771.19 comes off for the exempt debt portion.

Councilman Markovich - Off of the \$1,200 dollars, the \$1,196?

Ms. Pritchett - Yes, \$771.19 comes off for a \$150 thousand house.

Councilman Markovich - Well, you need to put those kinds of figures out there and explain that to everybody because just to say that it's only gonna be \$287 and then the next year \$309, only, only, only, but they're already paying \$600 a year on top of that. You're not coming across and letting the people know that.

Mr. Boone - We were only showing the impact of the referendum.

Councilman Markovich - Pardon me.

Mr. Boone - We're trying to depict the referendum impact.

Councilman Markovich - Well, yea, I mean, if you're only saying \$600 more over the next two years, that's only \$600 for a new school and upgrades and everything. But you got to tell them also that they're already paying \$600.

Mr. Boone - We're just trying to depict the referendum impact.

Councilman Markovich - But you got to show them the whole picture, not just the referendum. People don't know how much they're paying now for their schools, for their taxes on their \$150 thousand house.

Mr. Boone - It does appear on their tax bill.

Councilman Markovich - People don't really understand it. I talked to a guy today, a senior citizen, he just pays his bill and that's it. He don't know anything about that. That's what you need to explain. You know, that basically your taxes are gonna double, just for the schools alone, with that referendum.

Ms. Pritchett - For two years.

Councilman Markovich - Well, yea, and then whatever the figure is gonna be, you're saying \$771 or whatever is gonna come off after that?

Ms. Pritchett - And actually they'll see a decrease in 2020, yes. It'll be less than what they are paying currently this year.

Councilman Markovich - So you say.

Council President Venecz - Ms Pritchett and Mr. Boone, I understand you have some public forums coming up and would you like to announce publicly those dates so everyone has an opportunity. For those who have questions, every year a property owner gets a print out of our tax bill. It shows exactly where our taxes go. I would like to point out that of the property taxes that we pay, a portion of it goes to the County, to the Township, to the School District, to the Library and to the City. All are separate taxing authorities. None of them have any authority over each others taxing ability. So when you have these public forums, I urge everyone who is a property owner to pull this out. Go to the School City website and use the calculator. Councilman Kalwinski I did look at the rental properties and the rental properties impact was significant. So, would you like to announce those dates and locations so everyone can plan on attending? Then we will wrap up this portion of our meeting.

Ms. Mayerik announced the upcoming forums.

So these dollars will go into the Fund #257 and then be used as a match for that other grant fund.
