# **MAYOR'S ADDRESS**

Mayor McDermott- Hi, nice to see you all. Thanks. This is my address for the meeting of February 10<sup>th</sup>, excuse me, March 10th. Action items before the council tonight, we have an ordinance reclassifying certain lands in the city of Hammond for zoning purposes. This is, as we've all talked about in the previous meeting, and obviously this is coming up for 3<sup>rd</sup> and final today, it's a reclassification to rezone parts of the Memorial Park area to go from a recreational area to a recreational district, so we can move forward with the Memorial Park development. I'm looking forward to pushing that along. I appreciate all the help from Councilman Tyler on that issue. It's a multimillion dollar investment into Memorial Park, which is something, I'm greatly looking forward to. On another matter, the City of Hammond now, I was talking to a couple of the Councilmen before the meeting began, the City of Hammond is now the official owner of the haunted house, the site off of 80/94. We recently purchased it for 2.3 million, plus or minus, actually, it's a little bit over 2.3 million dollars. We're working with the tenants in the property because we're the landowners now. We're gonna work with them to get them the ability to move their stuff out of the building and then we're gonna get into the process of demolition. I appreciate the help of the Council on that issue and we're looking forward to, just like we did with the River Park Apartments, the former River Park Apartments site, which is now Oxbow landing. We expect and anticipate similar types of things happening with this development. I appreciate Councilman Emerson going along on this ride with us. It's a great project, I'm looking forward to working on that, probably for the next couple years. Activity log, I didn't come to the last meeting, so I covered some of the stuff that I think Scott covered previously as well. We attended the Southshore Convention and Visitors Bureau Annual Legislative Dinner in Indianapolis. I also had lunch separately with the CEO of the Southshore Convention and Visitors Bureau at Keith's in Whiting. That was an annual dinner, we have it, we go every year. Southshore's obviously got a lot of things going right now, I wanna make sure Hammond's represented. One in particular is, where the final location of where the Convention Center is gonna be, and obviously, Hammond has a lot of skin in that game. I met with the owners of Freddy's Steakhouse in regards to issues with the Kennedy Avenue reconstruction. I just drove down Kennedy, actually before I got here. I know basically 65 to Michigan Ave is down to 2 lanes, one lane in each direction. I know that has an effect on Freddy's business and everybody that is North of 165th is feeling the pain, but I just wanna keep in mind that when this is all done, we're gonna slow that

Mayor McDermott cont.- traffic down a lot and make it a lot more walkable, which is a lot better for development, just like we learned in downtown Hammond. I met with the Regional Director for the U.S. Senator, Jim Banks, LeAnn Angerman. I know LeAnn from the Lake County Election Board. She was the Republican on the board. LeAnn is now in a real important spot with the U.S. Senator, so it's nice that her and I have this relationship and are able to meet with each other. I appreciate her coming to Hammond City Hall. We were one of her first stops in her new role, so I think that's a good sign. I met with the CEO of Centier Bank, Chris Campbell, good guy. He does a lot of business with the City of Hammond in the City of Hammond. It's nice to have those relationships. I met with the Lake County Coroner, David Pastrick, to touch base between his staff and the leadership at the Hammond Police Department. We're missing connections between statistics that are important to the residents of Hammond. Sometimes, the Coroner, and the police department aren't on the same page and it's good to get on the same page every once in awhile. I appreciate David Pastrick coming to Hammond City Hall and touching base with the Hammond Police Department. I tried to do the same thing with the Lake County Prosecutor, didn't work out so well. They did send, we wanted to meet with Prosecutor Bernie Carter, and instead they sent staffers to meet with us. This is an important issue also. It's what happens when you have a resisting law enforcement charge against you, and you get into a fight with a police officer and the person's hurt, so they have a criminal charge hanging over their head, and they were hurt in a scuffle with a Hammond Police Officer, and then they sue us. It's really important that the Prosecutor's Office is on the same page as the City in situations like that, because if the Prosecutor's Office doesn't pursue the resisting law enforcement, that could have affect on our taxpayer dollars here in Hammond. I thought it was an important meeting. Hopefully, the next time we try to set it up with the Prosecutor, he'll actually come himself. I had breakfast with Lake County Councilman, Dave Hamm at The Wheel. It's always good to be on the same page with the County Council and the County Councilmen. I signed Public Works Local 142's contract, publically. They're under contract, as is all of our unions. They're all under contract for 4 more years. I presented to the Lakeshore Chamber of Commerce, my annual State of the City. I know that there was 6 Council people there. I appreciate you being there. I don't really care about, for me, I think it's important to show solidarity, during the State of the City, so to the 6 of you that showed up, I appreciate you being there. I attended a meeting between Horshoe Casino Hammond Executives and the Mayor in City Hall. Issues came up at a previous Mayor's Night Out, with people that are frustrated with a lack of action at Horshoe Casino. A question came up at Mayor's Night Out, and I answered it truthfully, and then shortly after that, I was called by the CEO of Horseshoe Casino. The big CEO, Caesar's CEO, came to Hammond, Indiana and met with us. I also met with the Horseshoe Casino Indiana Regional Director, Dan Nita as well as the local CEO, Bill Gustafson. I think we had a real good meeting. They wanted to let me know about some of the things that were happening, that they're trying to do to compete with Hard Rock. Unless you have any questions, that's my report for the last 2 weeks. I apologize about not being at the last meeting. I know Scott was here. I read the minutes, caught up. I know Councilman Barry had a couple questions about the fence. It was late in the day when I read those, I'm not sure if Scott followed them up or not.

Councilman Tyler is now present in the chambers.

Councilman Tyler-Yes.

Mayor McDermott- He did? Good. So unless anybody has any follow up questions?

Councilwoman Venecz- Mayor, when you have an update about the Horseshoe, would you please let us know?

# MAYOR'S ADDRESS cont.

Mayor McDermott - Yes ma'am. I can answer questions basically. I was expressing frustration, ok? I think a lot of us, everybody standing before me, has been in the City of Hammond, multiple decades, all of you. You guys have seen what Horseshoe used to be, and you see what's been going on lately, and it's a big difference in my opinion. I think we all share the same frustration, and it came up at Mayor's Night from a constituent, and I answered truthfully because I'm frustrated, and it got all the way up to the CEO, so they came out here, we had an honest conversation. You know me, I'm blunt. I feel like we can do better in Hammond. I think this is the best boat still in the state, but it's not performing that way. They talked about a couple things that we could do to help them. I'll have to come to you with a couple of them. Like, for instance, does Horseshoe Casino need to be a boat? Do we really have to have a Captain, or an engine room, and a crew? That costs money. I don't think that's important. It's not important to me. I don't know, maybe one of you can think of an idea of why they have to have a Captain of the Horseshoe Casino right now, because that ship ain't going anywhere. It can't even fit out of the Marina. So, things like that, that we can do to help them as well. Obviously, I have to come to you for that kind of stuff. I promise to keep you in the loop. Thank you.

Councilwoman Venecz- Thank you.

Councilman Kalwinski- Is that all they offered?

Mayor McDermott- What's that?

Councilman Kalwinski- as far as changes?

Mayor McDermott- No, they hear. I was talking about concerts a lot, talking about, I just don't think they're aggressive enough. I talked about the fact that we never built a hotel there. I think they should be thinking like that. One of the frustrating things for them as well, is the tolls going up on the skyway. The toll goes up to \$7, and then people are like, I don't want to pay that toll, maybe I'll just go down here on 80/94. There's a lot of things that are going on right now. I still think that we have the best boat in Indiana, Councilman Mark, and I'm frustrated. I felt good that the CEO came here. I did feel good about that. This is a guy that I see on CNBC, he came to Hammond. He heard about what's going on. They wanted to reiterate to us that, we're important to them. Keep in mind, once every 4 years, the Indiana Gaming Commission comes to the Mayor's and asks us how things are going. I don't remember the last time we did that letter, but it's probably coming up within the next year or 2. I'm gonna be honest. I want a good performing casino in Hammond. Maybe if another company owned it, maybe we would do better, and if we would do better with another company, maybe that should be explored by Indiana, because we wanna do well here in Hammond. I think you feel the same way I do, Councilman. If the current company doesn't wanna make it competitive, because they own 5 boats and it doesn't matter if Hammond is doing well, then maybe they should break off. Maybe it should become it's own separate casino.

Councilman Kalwinski- I heard scuttlebutt that they're using our boat as the tax write off because it's doing poorly, to balance their sheets.

Mayor McDermott- I couldn't tell you for sure, yes or no, but I've seen our boat with a lot less action. I'll be honest though, at the end of 2024, looking at the numbers, the numbers we get, they were down 30 percent. I thought it was more to be honest with you. 30 percent is a lot though, but I thought it would be more. So

Mayor McDermott cont. - actually, I don't know, it seems like they rallied in 2024. I thought it was gonna be much worse than it was, but I'm not thrilled with a 30 percent loss and I don't think it's done dropping either, Councilman.

Councilman Kalwinski- I agree.

Mayor McDermott- But, believe me, I promise you I didn't beat around the bush and I promise to keep you all in the loop, ok?

Council President Woerpel- Councilman Rakos, didn't me and you see John Fogerty there once, and now they're bringing Gene Simmons?

Mayor McDermott- Get your tickets. Any other questions? Thank you all, it was good to see you.

Councilman Tyler cont.- well as a senior facility building. I see Mayor, you're here too, and Mr. Poland, I asked you to stay to share a little bit more information about the project.

Mayor McDermott-Thanks, Councilman. Housing is in high demand in the city. We've been very successful across the city with multiple housing projects. Jacobs Square, we've been successful with 19 sites there. Dedelow Parkway, 6 lots. Jacobs Square is right across from City Hall, right across Calumet Avenue. Dedelow Parkway is right up by the golf course, we did 6 lots up there. Clark Fields, right in the Robertsdale section of Hammond, 37 lots sold at the auction. Florida Avenue in Hessville, 11 lots, ranch and 2 story homes, people are living in right now. Millennium Manor, this project was going before I even took over as Mayor, and we've recently rejuvenated, and Millennium Manor has 15 lots over there. In this proposal, Councilman Barry, there's 28 single family lots to be developed, in your district right over there at Memorial Park, 4 duplexes as well and as Councilman Barry indicated, 1 senior home. It's much like what we did over there on Sohl Street, the name escapes me right now.

# Councilman Tyler-Silver Birch

Mayor McDermott- Thank you, Silver Birch. Much like Silver Birch. We're working with a local community group, a pastor from the 3<sup>rd</sup> District that's a leader of the community is working with a group of entrepreneurs to put together that proposal. I think all in all, and obviously the council has been instrumental in this as well, by earmarking money from the federal government for this project. We've done our part locally to get this ready. This is just sort of the final step. Thank you, Councilman Barry for taking the leadership on this.

Councilman Tyler- I just want to share similar to what Mayor was saying, that this is, I think it's exciting. There's not a lot of new housing opportunities in our city and definitely not within the 3<sup>rd</sup> District. We had a park back there that was not being utilized as much as it used to. I grew up in that park, playing in that park and just saw it decline over years and especially with the renovation of MLK Park. I think a lot of people are taking advantage of what that has to offer. So when this opportunity came to the city, I know that Mayor and his administration were very excited about it, and we had several conversations with the community, who had some questions about the fidelity of how we were gonna go after and how we were gonna offer these lots and make sure people weren't priced out of their current homes. We've had those conversations. Mr. Poland, thank you for your work and diligence, and making sure these new lots are very similar to the current lots there. Once again, I'm just excited that we're gonna have an opportunity for families to either move into the 3<sup>rd</sup> or some current families to move out of their current homes into the senior building. I know my mother who is in the audience has already said that she might be interested in moving there. We'll see how all of this transpires. We're really excited about this development.

Mayor McDermott- We can sign her up right away. We have the documents here, Councilman. Councilman Barry, brought up an important point, I appreciate you bringing it up. There was a lot of concern, as the Councilman indicated, about, The Councilman wanted these lots to be affordable, and at the same time, we wanted this to be consistent with what we're doing across the city as well, so there was some back and forth as the Councilman indicated. I think we came up with a real good resolution. I think initially, there was supposed to be more lots, and we expanded the lot size, and reduced the number of tenants back there, so it's more consistent with what we're doing across the city, but as the Councilman indicated, there's been a lot of work done over the last 2 or 3 years on this project. We've already done a lot of the heavy lifting with the financing
