MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Mayor McDermott - It's good to see you all, welcome back. This is my report for July 27, 2026. We've been following along the saga of Clark High School and Gavit High School and the wrestling match between the School City of Hammond and the Civil City so we can take possession of these buildings and demolish it and move forward with our lives. I've got good news on Gavit. I mean, we're moving forward on Gavit, on Clark we're still in a holding pattern, Councilman Mark. But we're working on it. The fact that we're moving forward, I think, is positive. We have a memorandum of understanding between the School City of Hammond and Purdue Northwest regarding the use of the area of the former Gavit High School Football field. So they're not talking about the building itself. They're talking about the area behind the building. Purdue is looking to expand their sports program. They're looking to use those fields. They've been talking about this for years. Our action, through the demolition process, putting this on the demo list, has prompted Purdue and School City of Hammond to get together. Prompted the School City of Hammond, let's be honest, to get together. Purdue has always been willing. They entered into a memorandum of understanding for the next year to explore the possibility of moving forward with this property. I think it's great news. I'm, obviously, a fan of Purdue's expansion across the city. They've expanded into the 2nd District, Downtown Hammond. Obviously, they're all over the 5th and I guess they have a little bit in the 6th District. But, for the most part, Purdue Northwest does a great job when they own property and I appreciate their continued expansion. So, they'll be looking to get into the 4th District in this case I guess, right? No, Gavit's yours. I'll just stop talking. This is a summery for the Festival of the Lakes. We had five nights of the Festival of the Lakes. On Wednesday, we had Freestyle Night, in addition to the Golf Outing and the Car Show, and the Polka Fest, which I attended, in addition to all the stuff, the 5K, all the stuff for Special Person's Day, the Fishing Derby, the stuff that is just constantly going during that week. We also had the main acts and we took attendance through the grace of the Hammond Police Department. They had the ability to count tenants. We had 9 thousand people attend Freestyle Night. That was the first time we've done that. It's a low cost option. It gives us good options for Wednesday Night. I think, for the most part, we broke even that night. When it came to money, when you count the fact that the beer garden

Mayor McDermott cont. - made \$40 thousand that night. We had a pretty good night. So, Jellyroll, we had 7,700 people in the park that day. That's a concert. It would have been 25 to 50 thousand if we had a free show like everything else, but we held it down because it's a concert. We did really well revenue-wise. We sold close to \$800 thousand worth of tickets. \$70 thousand in the beer garden alone. So, we had a good night with Jellyroll. The Offspring was our best night in the amount of money we made. That's because we won the insurance lottery that night. It rained .35 inches after 5 o'clock. I was doing the rain dance in Robertsdale. I was very, very happy for our city. So we got our money for the act that night, plus the act played, which is the perfect scenario for the Festival of the Lakes. Offspring had a great show that night. Beer garden did great that night. Beer garden did great. \$50 thousand in the beer garden. \$30 thousand in parking. It was a really, really, good night. So, I love it when it rains during the Festival of the Lakes. Especially if we can get the act on. Saturday, we're gonna talk about that when we get done with this, it was ridiculously packed. I talked to ... so, first off, we had 17 thousand people show up for that show. We did really well revenue-wise, as you'd imagine when you have 17 thousand people show up. However, we did have a number of people that got blocked out, from the massive crowd. These are free shows, that was a free show that night. I was talking a little earlier about Kevin Gates and Moneybagg Yo, at the Festival of the Lakes we're used to getting bands that are not currently relevant, these gentlemen are currently relevant and we saw a massive crowd. It's a free show. In a lot of cases, I know I talked to Councilwoman Alexander, paying customers couldn't get in because they were blocked out by the free customers. Which is a danger when you're having a free show. We locked in ... we also had complications that night because it rained the night before and we lost half of the D lot. That's our biggest lot. So we lost half the D lot, we have a massive show, a lot more people showed up than we anticipated, and we got overwhelmed that night. So we did really well, revenue-wise and we had agreed this week, we got the Festival of the Lakes team together. We do have a number of people, like Councilwoman Alexander, that couldn't get into the show. And it's not fair if they bought a ticket and they paid for parking and they couldn't get into the show. So we agreed to refund everybody that can prove to us that they bought a ticket and they couldn't get into the show. So if you didn't scan your ticket, if you didn't scan your parking ticket, we've already starting refunding the people in that situation. I know the Councilwoman is a supporter. I apologized to her. There was, unfortunately, quite a few people in your situation, Councilwoman. So, we did start the process of refunding this week. We didn't do a press release on it, because if we did we'd have thousands of people putting in and we'd have to dig through them. We figured, the real ones were the ones that contacted us already. So, if you can prove to us, and you haven't contacted City Hall about not being able to get into that show, we will refund you, as long as your ticket wasn't scanned for parking or for the show. Sunday, we had more people, but the D lot was in service on Sunday and we were able to accommodate them. And, by the way, well we'll get to the D lot in a second. Sunday we had our biggest day, 21 thousand people, over 21 thousand people. \$80 thousand in the beer garden that night. That was also a winner. We did really well with Banda el Rocodo. That's the second time they've played Hammond. They did a lot bigger night this time than they did last time, so. Anyway, the problems that we had with D lot are being rectified before next years festival. Especially because we lost Clark High School parking, we can't lose D lot. So we have to make D lot serviceable even when it rains, and we're working on that. We're not gonna pave it, because it's a park, but we're gonna work on some options so that we could park even in a rain situation. That was the main culprit that night. So, I apologize, Councilman Mark. We had a lot of people parking in the neighborhoods, and you know we fight against that. That was a bad night. I acknowledge it from where I sit. It was overwhelming crowd. A lot of people were parking illegally. They were just trying to

Mayor McDermott cont. - get in. Anyway, we learn a lot every year we run the Fest and we're gonna fix it next year and do better, so. Did you have any questions, Councilwoman. I know that you and I talked on that night.

Councilwoman Alexander - You didn't give the attendance for the Offspring night.

Mayor McDermott - I'm sorry, 11,700; 21 thousand for Banda el Rocodo; about 17 thousand for Moneybagg Yo and Bill Gates.

Councilwoman Alexander - My question, I know we talked about this, is maybe for the next, probably next two years, before all this stuff with the Bears come up and everything, maybe we go to R&B, maybe thinking about like a Fantasia or a Boys to Men or something. Just to bring that crowd down. Because we know when we bring rap, it does bring a different audience. I mean, we had a lot ... I mean, just the experience of driving on the road. Just to get from the hotel to the actual 129th was like an hour and a half drive. You literally had people ... and the police did a really good job. I want to give them their kudos. It was crazy, people getting out of their cars and walking down the middle of the street. It was, like, nuts. But, the one thing is, like I said, if we kinda change the genre, you know music plays a lot of part in a lot of things that maybe for the next two years we can go to R&B type thing and change that atmosphere a little bit. Like I said, maybe a Fantasia or Boys to Men or something, an older crown to rectify some of those other issues that were going on that night.

Mayor McDermott - I appreciate the input. It was ... I agree with you, by the way. We do all kinds of music. We don't do rap every year, like we did Akon last year and we didn't have any problems like this, but it was a much smaller crowd also. Sometimes you get overwhelming crowds. And the reason it took you an hour and a half from the hotel, I don't deny that, to get down Calumet Avenue, is that they were out of parking.

Councilwoman Alexander - Exactly.

Mayor McDermott - And they were like where do we put all of these cars. It was a bad night.

Councilwoman Alexander - I talked to a few officers on the road and everything it was like, it's closed. The other suggestion was maybe, in the instance of that, maybe the Council people get a special pass or there's some type of parking somewhere for them to be able to get in and still continue to support and continue to monitor, get those updates, or ...

Mayor McDermott - You guys get the sponsor because you're sponsors, and we couldn't even get the sponsors in because they were blocked out by the free crowd, so. But we'll work with you. I appreciate the recommendations, Councilwoman. I haven't even got into my report, I mean as far as ... I don't have a lot actually, because Festival of the Lakes was a lot of it. Summery of the schedule over the last two weeks. I appeared on WJOB Morning Show with Tom Dabertin to discuss 2026 Festival of the Lakes. Interviewed by NBC Channel 5's Mary Ann Ahern for the latest updates on the possibility of the Chicago Bears locating their stadium to Hammond. Spoke to all the Festival of the Lakes employees before opening day. I do that every year. I like remind them that there's gonna be 100,000 people that are gonna come through here. We gotta be nice.

MAYOR'S ADDRESS cont.

Mayor McDermott cont. - We gotta like, it's like Disneyland, we do the Disneyland speech every year. So, I attended NIRPC Full Commission meeting in Portage, Indiana right in the middle of the Festival. That was painful but I made it. Because we got to represent Hammond, so. I appeared on Chicago Bears Podcast Braggs in the Stand, concerning the latest update on the possibility of the Bears locating to Hammond. Lunch with the executives from the engineering firm American Structurepoint in regards to numerous Structurepoint projects across the City of Hammond. Internal meeting to discuss complaints from the Saturday night show, inability to get into the venue because of the massive crowd size. There's where we decided we were gonna refund for the people that could prove that they didn't get through, like the Councilwoman. And then attended the Summer Concert Series to see Fleetwood Mac cover band from Chicago Second Hand News. I do want to remind people every Saturday at the Pavilion for the rest of the summer we're doing the summer concert series. I forgot who's playing this Saturday but every Saturday night they're great bands. We had about 500 people watch Secondhand News this week. It's free. You can bring your own food. Bring your own drinks. So, a reminder, quality of life issue, you can go out there for free and enjoy the Pavilion every week the entire summer. That's all I got Councilwoman, unless you have any questions.

Councilman Kalwinski - You're right. It was the biggest crowd I remember there since we started this. It was a nice crowd. So, kudos. Anything new regarding Data Center property?

Mayor McDermott - No, being honest. I think the data center group was shocked that we meant what we said. We said July 1st. If we don't have an answer we're not gonna talk about it. July 1st came and I haven't talked to them. I ran into one of the Principle's of Decennial, we talked, it wasn't anything about that. It was just being nice to each other. Seeing each other. But I haven't heard anything, Councilman, since the first of the month. I did get an update from the State of Indiana today on what's going on with the Bears. Still moving forward. A lot of testing going on in our City right now. Testing is great, but results take a bit of time. So, I knew that when we started this new curve ball, so to speak, it was gonna cost us some time. This is what we're dealing with right now and Chicago Media still wants to talk about it but there's not really much to talk about right now. It's ... the Bears are holding all the cards. You know. They're doing a lot of testing in our City. I can tell you they're very focused. Every consultant, every lawyer they have is working on Hammond. That's it. They're not working on Arlington Heights, they're not working on Chicago, they're working on Hammond. All of them, the lawyers, the engineers, the consultants, the PR people. They're all working on Hammond. They're in Hammond. They're working on Hammond. They're testing Hammond. So, I know we hear a lot of stuff from the Chicago Media that, it's like, oh, this is the new city that's gonna get the Bears Stadium. No it's not. No, it's not. Because they have the same problem Arlington Heights has. The same problem Chicago has. Illinois can't afford it. That's their problem. So, when they come up with all these curve balls, it's like, oh McCook wants to throw it out there, oh, how about this place, I just ignore it and stay focused on getting the Bears what the need in Hammond where all of their consultants and all of their lawyers are working so that we can close this deal. By, hopefully, fall. And hopefully we're all celebrating in the fall. I think that's reasonable, so. Any other questions?

Councilwoman Alexander - Mayor, what I did not say during the other portion, was kudos to the team. They did an amazing job, as usual. From Police, Fire, I mean, just watching Police and Fire in action on those nights when people were getting overheated and things, they did an amazing job, and parking people. I just want to

Councilwoman Alexander cont. - make sure that they get their kudos, because it is a lot of work for them on those nights. A lot of them are coming from working their regular shift and then doing the Fest, so kudos to all those that did work for the event.

Mayor McDermott - It was hundreds of hours that team puts in there that week, so, it's a rough one.

Councilwoman Alexander - Absolutely, Eileen did a great job.

Mayor McDermott - I appreciate it, Councilwoman. I know it's frustrating for the people that couldn't get in. It sucks, you know, we don't want it to be like that. And as Councilman Mark said, it was one of the biggest nights he can remember. I'll be honest. And the numbers don't bear out what I saw. It was crazy.

Councilman Kalwinski - It looked bigger than that.

Mayor McDermott - It was crazy. It was bigger than the number. It was crazy.

Councilwoman Alexander - That was just the number inside.

Mayor McDermott - Yeah, it was the number inside. The number outside was big too.

Councilwoman Alexander - The number outside was crazy.

Mayor McDermott - I agree with you, Councilwoman. That was one of the biggest nights I can remember at the festival. It reminds me of Los Tucanes de Tijuana, which was our biggest night ever. That's what Saturday night reminded me of. So, I apologize to the people that didn't get in. If you paid VIP, you're getting refunded. If you paid for parking and you didn't use it, you're getting refunded. We're not being unfair about this. The Fest isn't there to gouge you. It's there to break even. I think we might have actually done it this year. Which is wonderful, so.

Councilman Woerpel - I kind of hesitate to say this, but, um, the Jellyroll show.

Mayor McDermott - I knew you were gonna talk about Jellyroll.

Councilman Woerpel - I know a lot because of my son's lifestyle. I know a lot of people and families that struggle and the feed back that I got personally and what I saw out there from these people that suffer in silence and the sea of tears that I saw. I've been asked by several people to thank you for bringing him to Hammond.

Mayor McDermott - He was a nice guy. It was really cool. He went to ... I know it was covered a little bit but sometimes people aren't reading the newspaper. You know, Jellyroll spent the day in Hammond. That day he flew into the Gary Airport, drove to the Sportsplex, his whole team. Played basketball at the sportsplex for like three hours. Taking pictures with the people over there. I know the Sportsplex staff and all that. Then he came

Mayor McDermott cont. - over to the show. It was like a revival. It was really neat. I've never been to a Jellyroll show. He was a really nice person. He got tattooed from a Hammond Tattoo artist. Ate Greek food from a Hammond Greek Restaurant, Tzaziki's. He even got a tattoo from The Tattoo Lady. He even got tattooed in our City.

Councilman Woerpel - He's the only artist I've ever seen that drove his own car into the show and he had the coolest police escort ever. When he got out of the car, he made the comment that that's the best police escort he's ever had where the police were in front of him. But he really thought the way Hammond treated him was impressive.

Mayor McDermott - Yeah, that was a neat night, Dave. Yeah, I agree with you.

Councilman Woerpel - But just that the people that suffer in silence that I saw out there and the feedback I got from them. They really appreciated that show.

Mayor McDermott - And I appreciate you bringing that up, Dave, and reminded me about that night. That night was important for a lot of things. That was a big band for us. It's the biggest band we've ever had. I dare say. The biggest act we've ever had. And that act brought out a bunch of big wigs from the company that books all these acts and there was this big executive in the audience that day. He saw the way we all were handling things back stage and the way Jellyroll was happy with everything. That's huge for us. It's like passing a test, guys. So, Festival of the Lakes, you know, we could keep on booking acts like this if we keep on doing a good job, so. Thankfully they weren't there Saturday night. Any more questions? By the way this is not a one person job. I've seen a lot of cities where the Council and the Mayor don't get along. I've seen a lot of cities that don't move forward because the Council and the Mayor are constantly fighting. So, like, everything we're celebrating in Hammond is because, it is, I can't do this by myself. So I appreciate the Council and everything you guys have done for a long time to put us where we are. We're in a good spot right now. So, thank you guys. Have a good Council meeting,

Just to address it as an overview, Councilman Rakos and I have been working with Sounds of Sarah, it's an organization that brings attention to saving lives, and I don't know the exact medical term but it's through

Councilman Woerpel cont. - Narcan. Sounds of Sarah provides Narcan boxes for any city or town buildings that want to be used. As far as the vending machines go, I am aware there is one in front of Barton's Pizza. But those are more on the owner to get them. If that makes any sense. Like, I know the Griffith Fire Department has a Narcan vending machine in front of it and you can do that, it's free to the public, or we can get these Narcan boxes through Sounds of Sarah. So, I just wanted to make the point clear that it's not as easy as just saying, "We want the vending machine", because there's a process that you have to go through if you're a business or an organization that wants them and there is a maintenance fee on them. Whereas the alternative is to ... and I'm not sure if the schools take the Narcan boxes, but I know all city and town buildings are eligible to get these boxes. Like I said, Councilman Rakos and I have been working with Sounds of Sarah to make that a priority for the rest of the year.

Council President Venecz - So it requires some work.

Councilman Woerpel - Yeah, I've been working through Patty Stovall, who runs Sound of Sarah, it's her daughter that passed away, and I hope that clears that up. It's not that we are ignoring the vending machines it's just a more complicated process. You actually have to get business owners to either apply for a grant to get the machine or buy the machine outright, and to fill it is like \$1,500 every time you fill the machine. In a perfect world, a lot of businesses would want them but there's also financial constraints with that program.

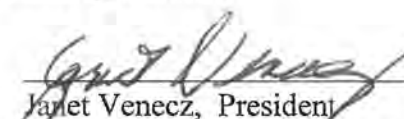
